Do-it-yourself justice

Whenever a particularly horrible crime unbalances our community, we hear a cry for "revenge" (though the more righteous would cry "justice"). A long prison sentence will not slake; the people say enough! Let us have a life for a life.

Kokoda Crescent brings us a group of people who seek their own 'justice'. They are ordinary grandparents who unite for a Third War — the war against the drug traffickers and the killers of one of their number's grandson.

There is no God to comfort them or grieve with them. The minister at the funeral can barely remember the boy's name. God is irrelevant to this picture.

The police are also irrelevant — after all, they are all corrupt or useless. It seems there is no justice for ordinary people unless they seek it for themselves.

These former veterans and their wives embark on a mission. It is a mission for the whole nation and it is essential they succeed, since their revenge will not only be personal, but represent all of the aggrieved. I am sure that some people watching this film will experience a cathartic reaction.

Usually Warren Mitchell and Ruth Cracknell slay with jokes, but in this picture, humour is only used to moderate the tension and sentimentality. It is plain that a master (Patrick Cook) has been at work on the script.

Kokoda Crescent is an important film in Australian cinema history. Rarely have films been made with an older audience in mind.

For most viewers it will provide entertainment and a chance to secretly cheer the veterans on. However, like the writer of *Ecclesiastes*, we should reflect that the wicked do prosper and evil is not easily blown away. The writer also reminds us that God will bring every act to judgement.
